
Dear Members,

DO YOU KNOW OF AN IRISH IMMIGRANT INTO WISCONSIN?

Jane Maher, President of Irish Genealogical Society of Wisconsin has asked us to bring this information to our membership. The absolute deadline for adding data to the *Greening of Wisconsin* is 15 March 1993. It is hoped that much more information will be added to the data base before that time.

Any person who has information about an Irish immigrant into Wisconsin, or about his/her children is requested to send that information to Irish Genealogical Society of Wisconsin, 2476 LEFEBER AVE, WAUWATOSA WI 53213. Sample forms will be available at the 3 December 1992 MAGG meeting and from the above address. In addition to the information requested on the form, it is important to note that 4 lines, of 80 spaces each, have been set aside for additional information for each Irish person entered in the data base. Information on birth, occupation, names of parents, etc. are put here.

They plan to publish the names and addresses of contributors unless specifically instructed not to. There is a release, giving them permission, on the form. Although we ask for the phone number of those sending in data, they will not publish phone numbers. There is no charge for submitting entries.

There could be helpful information in the medical file, but you must request it.--from *Chelan Valley WA Gen. The card catalog of the Allen County Public Library in Ft. Wayne, IN is now accessible from your home. A computer with a modem and communication software is necessary. The dial-up access number is 219-424-1330.

Communications settings should be: 1200 baud, 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, no parity, and VT-100 emulation.

Press enter and "Control O" twice to get the welcome screen to start your search. When you are finished press "Control O" to log off. Then disconnect according to your software instructions. There are no access charges, but you will be charged for a long distance phone call if you are not calling from Ft. Wayne.

Access is available from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday; Friday and Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and Sunday, 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. (Source: Prodigy Service, "Ft. Wayne Lib.-On-Line" 9 April 1992.)

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GERMAN EMIGRATION TO AMERICA

The Dream Spinner is a film saga of the Germans in Missouri. This is a major film dealing with European Emigration to America. The film was filmed on location in Missouri. The color 30 minute VHS video runs \$49.50, and the 16mm film costs \$249.50.

Gottfried Duden's book, Report on a Journey to the Western States of North America, was published in Germany in 1829. In it, Duden gave glowing accounts of the advantages of the soil and climate of Missouri, inducing thousands of Germans from Europe and the eastern United States to settle there. [Ed's note: Similar accounts were made in the early 1700's to entice Germans to come to America.] In this drama Duden returns in a dream sequence and observes what happens to "his people." The film features spectacular scenery (including aerial footage), an original music score, and a totally unique view of our immigrant ancestors.

The author recommends the video for classes in history, sociology, political science, fine arts, and humanities. Checks should be made out to Dr. James E. 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"PEDIGREE"

In the middle ages, monks spent their time researching and writing genealogical charts and histories. As they went from one generation to another, the monks would note this with a small three-line mark (a long line in the center with two small lines angling out on each side). The mark looked to them like the foot of the crane, which is "pied de grue" (pronounced pee-yay dgrew) in French. CONFUSION OF DATES BETWEEN 1582 AND 1752

[Ed's note: The quaint style has been kept. Compare comprehension with modern usage.] In Old Style the year commenced on the 25 of March. The correction of the calendar year by Pope Gregory, in 1582 was not adopted by the British Parliament until 1751, when it was ordered that eleven days should be struck out of September 1752, and the third day of that month was reckoned the fourteenth. This latter mode of reckoning is called "New Style," and the year commenced the first of January. Before 1752, there was sometimes a confusion in dates, it being difficult to determine whether January, February and a part of March closes the year or begins another. Hence, the mode of double dates, as "January 1, 1668-9" which is 1669 New Style. In order to find the day of the month in New Style, corresponding to a given day of any month in Old Style, we must consider the latter as eleven days in advance of the former, and add eleven days to the present date. For instance, the 24 of March 1668, Old Style, corresponds to 4 April 1669, New Style.--from *Whitman Co. Gen. Soc. WRITING DATES

Use the day, month, and year system with the month spelled out (or abbreviated), and the year in full. Writing 6 September 1965 or 6 Sep 1965, leaves no doubt--but 9/6/65 often makes the reader wonder if you intended 6 September or 9 June, and the '65 to a genealogist is just simply incomplete because most of us are doing research in several centuries. Make it specific: 1965, 1865, 1765, 1665, etc.--from *Newsletter* (Clark County Genealogical Society, Vancouver, Washington), (October 1992) p. 3.

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CATHOLIC CHURCH RECORDS

It is interesting to speculate on why family Bible records appear so seldom in Catholic families. A number of reasons suggest themselves. Given their hierarchical view of church structure. Catholics seem to have been content to rely on their parish priests and other Church officials to maintain this kind of vital record for them. At the same time, because liturgy of the Mass and the sacramental system were the central features of Catholic devotional life, the very ownership of Bibles by individual Catholics was the exception rather than the rule it was among Protestants. Thus, in most cases, there was no family Bible in which to record this information. Finally, membership in the Catholic Church was seen as something to be taken for granted, a part of one's heritage, and the need for individual records to document one's Catholicism was therefore slight.--from *New Eng. Hist. & Gen. Register via Newsletter* (Clark County Genealogical Society, Vancouver, Washington), (October 1992) pp. 3-4.

CEMETERY RESEARCHING

A burial permit is not a good source of information ... it is not very informative. Check with the sexton (sometimes called superintendent) of the cemetery. The sexton may be able to tell you where your relatives were buried. Cemetery maps may be available. Sexton's records should be reviewed for any additional information they may hold. If the town sexton is not available you can check with the county office or a funeral director. Ask the people in the locale. Check with the library. See if there are genealogy groups or societies in the area.

Visiting the cemetery. There are two kinds of lots (1) family lots with up to 6, 8 or 10 places available and (2) single grave plots. The single grave sections were areas where a person was buried one after the other. If there are no dates available, check the end of the rows for their dates, to get a general idea of when the person died. Single graves were often a part of a "potter's field." For a baby or infant section follow the same rule of thumb as far as dates go. Years ago people usually bought plots next to someone they knew, either family or neighbors.

Take an older person along to the cemetery with you. They usually have vivid recollections and can give clues to assist in locating a grave site. Remember to check the tombstones in the same vicinity for locations and dates. They can sometimes give you clues.

Years ago families usually repeated the same names. You may run across three people with the same identical name.

Copy inscriptions word for word and letter for letter. Note any marking on the stone, eg.: age, "In memory of...", religious affiliations and clubs, eg.: a K.C. member, member of the Masonic order or LOOF (Loyal Order of Odd Fellows).

Tombstone Rubbings. Take along: wrapping paper (birthday, christmas, etc.), masking tape, scissors, spray container with water or vinegar and water mixed half and half, nylon bristled scrub brush (no wire bristles), rags, colored rubbing wax or colored jumbo sized chalk, paper towels, mosquito spray, sunscreen, wet wipes for cleaning hands, 35 mm camera with film and flash, garden shears to cut away overgrown grass, a gardening pad to kneel on, paper and pen and cold drinks. Clean the stone by spraying with water and dry. You may have to use the scrub brush to clean the stone. Place the wrapping paper over the stone and tape securely. Rub the chalk over the paper to bring out the details in the stone.

Another suggestion is to wear slacks and boots or high top shoes to guard against poison oak or ivy, snakes etc. If you start assembling things in a box now, you will be ready to go when the time comes. Spring is considered the best time to visit cemeteries. If the cemetery is old and not well taken care of, the weeds will not be so high and the brush will not be leafed out. Snakes may even be hibernating also. Visiting a cemetery around Memorial Day after the cemetery has been cleaned is the next best time. The worse times to visit cemeteries are Autumn and Winter when leaves and/or snow cover things that you might find.

Taking pictures. Tips: You can get a better picture with the sun at an angle or facing the stone. Mirrors may be helpful. Centralize the stone. Always check the background. Consider including a cousin or descendent in one of the views. Black and white works better for publication.

SHAVING CREAM IS A NO-NO!

Shaving cream contains oils that may stain old porous stone permanently. Please continue to use white chalk which washes off.
