Kenneth James Wood July 23, 1939 ~ March 17, 2023

It is with great sadness that we share with our readers and members, the death of local historian and genealogist, Kenneth J. Wood.

Kenneth James Wood, age 83, of Marshfield passed away early Friday, March 17th, 2023 to join his Irish ancestors. Memorial services will be held on Friday March 24, 2023 at Hansen Schilling Funeral Home. Visitation will be from 9:00 am - 11:00 with a service at 11:00 am and a lunch to follow. Please join us to celebrate this intelligent, kind, lifelong educator's life, to share memories and comfort. Committal of remains will take place at a later date.

Ken was born to Richard and Ruth (Fitzpatrick) Wood in Oconto Wisconsin on July 23, 1939. As an only child, Ken attended schools in Oconto and Milwaukee. He graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1962 and started a teaching career that took him from Rosholt to Hilbert to Appleton. He retired after 32 years of teaching Junior and Senior high school classes in History, English, Geography, and Social Studies, along with other duties and classes, as assigned.

Ken married Nancy Mc Gillivray on June 5, 1965 in Leopolis, WI. Together they raised three fine sons - Michael, Jason, and Jeremy along with treasured family pets. They later divorced. Ken married Phyllis E. Wolf Drexler on July 21, 1995, in Marshfield, WI. They later divorced. On April 28, 2007, he married Lori Belongia in Marshfield, WI. They were together until his last day.

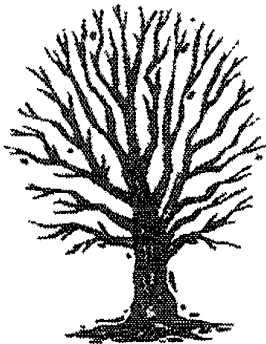

Irish Roman Catholic Records Available Online

Genealogists researching their Irish Catholic ancestors have faced a frustrating lack of easily available sacramental records for years. Exciting developments over the last year have now made the task much easier. Most parish registers were micro-filmed by the National Library of Ireland starting in the 1950's through the 1970's on a diocese-by-diocese basis, covering records up to 1880. But without knowing the exact parish and either making a trip to Ireland or hiring a researcher, making use of these records was extremely difficult if not impossible.

In 2010 it was decided to digitize the microfilm containing over 3500 registers, and in October 2014 the NLI board approved making the images available in a dedicated free access database, made public in mid-2015. This was a giant step forward but did eliminate the need to know the exact parish of your ancestor.

March 2016 marks a milestone for Irish researchers, with the release of a free searchable index to the Catholic Church registers. Both *FindMyPast.ie* and *Ancestry.com* in a joint effort now have created a searchable index available covering 1655 to 1915. Keep in mind that date coverage varies from parish to parish. The indexes at both sites link directly to the digitized pages on the NLI website.

If you can only access the index on these two sites, or already know your parish, once you have a citation you can always visit the NLI free website at <http://register.nli.ie/> and navigate to the record set for the parish you are interested in.

A Note from one of our members...

I have another photo that may interest you, since you also included a list of First War draft callups. Two of the boys on the list are the brothers Bernard Beaver and Matthew Beaver, my great-uncles. Bernard (Vernie) is on the far left in the photo with three more of his brothers, William, Philip, and Peter. (There were twelve sons in the family.) It appears that the photo was taken in 1919, after the war, since two of them have one-year service chevrons.



They were the sons of German immigrants who had married in Jefferson, Wisconsin, in 1872, and then established a prosperous farm in Loyal. It appears that they did not hesitate to return to Europe and face their cousins across the battlefield.

New Genome Map Tries To Capture All Human Genetic Variation

The joke about the Human Genome Project is how many times it's been finished, but not actually.

The first time was in 2000, when Bill Clinton announced the "first survey of the entire human genome" at a White House ceremony, calling it "the most important and most wondrous map ever produced by humankind."

But the job wasn't done. A year later, the triumph was announced again, this time with the formal publication of a "draft" of "the genetic blueprint for a human being." In 2003, researchers had another go at the finish line, claiming the "successful completion" of the project, citing better levels of accuracy. Nineteen years later, in 2022, they again claimed victory, this time for a really, truly "complete" sequence of one genome—end to end, no gaps at all. Pinkie promise.

Today, researchers announced yet another version of the human genome map, which they say combines the complete DNA of 47 diverse individuals—Africans, Native Americans, and Asians, among other groups—into one giant genetic atlas that they say better captures the surprising genetic diversity of our species.

The new map, called a "pangenome," has been a decade in the making, and researchers say it will only get bigger, creating an expanding view of the genome as they add DNA from another 300 people from around the globe. It was published in the journal *Nature* today.

"We now understand that having one map of a single human genome cannot adequately represent all of humanity," says Karen Miga, a professor at the University of California, Santa Cruz, and a participant in the new project.

Diversity in detail

People's genomes are largely alike, but it's the hundreds of thousands of differences, often just single DNA letters, that explain why each of us is unique.

WISCONSIN BIRTHS IN 1940 TOTALLED 54,712

Madison (AP)
Wisconsin births last year totalled 54,712, an increase of 2,112 over the seven-year mean average, the State Board of Health announced today.

"There were 561 sets of twins among the newcomers," the Board reported.

"Male births exceeded female births by 1,245, following a pattern of nature which is equalized in later life 'by higher male than female mortality rates."

The total does not include 1,-195 stillbirths. The Board reported they were limited to 21.8 per 1,000 live births, a decrease of 1.8 per 1,000 from the seven-year average.

Of the babies born last year, 432 were Indian and 172 were Negro, the Board reported.

Recruits for the great army which Uncle Sam is raising will be contributed by Clark county from the list below. This is the list of the names of those in the war draft, the men of 20 to 45. With each name will be found his order number first, which indicates the relative order in which he will be called. The second number given is the serial number by which he is known in the registration.

This reserve of manpower is created in addition to those previously registered.

The order of call was determined by the great national lottery, conducted at Washington, with drawings from the now-famous fish bowl.
