

Dutch Colonial 813 W. 5th Street

This American style originated in homes built by German, or "Deutsch" settlers in Pennsylvania as early as the 1600s. A hallmark of the style is a broad gambrel roof with flaring eaves. End walls are generally of stone, and the chimney is usually located on one or both ends. Double-hung sash windows and dormers with shed-like overhangs, and a central Dutch double doorway are also common. However this house features a portico entry with sidelights at the door, a gabled roof, and a cowl atop the chimney.



The home is historically known as the Everett & Luthera Upham House and/or the Thomas. J. Novicki House and was built in 1898.
